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Minister's Letter

Dear Friends



Last week Jessica Ennis-Hill announced her retirement from athletics. Since becoming the poster-girl for the 2012 London Olympics, Ennis-Hill, with her dedication to her sport, has offered a role model for many youngsters encouraging them to commitment as well as fitness. Although her retirement is perhaps not unexpected, her retiral still leaves a gap in the athletics arena.

We all need good role models. These are people who set us an example as we seek to navigate our journey through life. For most of us the first role models we encounter will be our parents and grandparents but we will also adopt others as we grow beyond the family setting into new situations and experiences. We will find people whom we admire and seek to emulate them.

In the Bible we find many examples of role models – not all of them good! In the Old Testament stories, we encounter kings and

judges and prophets, people like ourselves who are capable of great good yet who sometimes get things dreadfully wrong. In the New Testament, the stories of the early Church and the parables of Jesus provide a wealth of role models. But ultimately there is only one truly good role model and that is Jesus himself.

It is Jesus who calls us to follow him in loving God and our neighbour. One of the attractions of the Christian faith is that it does not ask us primarily to commit to a particular creed or statement of faith. Rather it has at its heart an invitation to follow Christ and his example of love and service, and it is as we do so that we encounter his living presence.

November is a time for remembering and giving thanks for all those who have been role models of love and service in the past. But we do so recognising that Jesus is inviting us to follow that same way of love and service in our own time. And so at the end of the month, as we move into Advent, we begin our annual Advent/Christmas appeal for Christian Aid and its work with the poorest of the poor throughout the world. But this year as well, in recognition of the difficulties faced by some in the present economic climate, we will be seeking to do something practical for the hungry and homeless in our own city.

The young people of QII are offering us a role model here. They have agreed every day in Advent to put aside a tin or a packet of dried food as part of a "reverse advent calendar". If any of you would like to participate in this you can bring your donations to the Church, either during the week or every Sunday in Advent. Each Sunday

the box will be taken to a different charity with which Greenbank already has connections.

I hope that you will find participation in this practical action helpful as part of your preparations in the countdown to Christmas.


Remembrance Sunday – 13th November

for organising the two buffets over the evening – the stovies going down a treat. Many thanks to all helpers – the feedback has been consistent in saying there was a really good atmosphere through the whole evening.

The net amount raised for the evening came to £830. This is less than previous years – principally as fewer "adult tickets" were taken up, but

we hope to see all those who missed out back again next year...?

Treasure Trail

The weather for the Treasure Trail event could not have been better. Fourteen teams went off round the course answering clues along the way – and none got lost and all found out something new about Morningside! So there was no need for the excellent Indoor Trail around the Church buildings – but if any group wish to use it (for a YACHT donation of course!) please let us know.

After the Trail, there was badge making and crafting, Bouncy Castle and Beat the Goalie (Kenny Htet-Khin proving too good for us). Everyone enjoyed the tea/coffee and baking supplied by those who had contributed recipes for the *Greenbank Recipe Book*, unveiled on the day, along with the *Greenbank Calendar for 2017*. Sales of Calendars, Recipe Books and baking were pretty brisk on the day (and the following Sunday) which was rewarding to Alison and John Murison for their efforts in producing these items.

The amount raised over those two days totalled £1,740 and since then further sales of Recipe Books and Calendars up to Sunday 9th October have totalled £446. So keep on buying – perfect for Christmas presents.

Other news

On other news, the Committee were delighted to hear that the Scouts were to be supplying Christmas trees again this year, sharing proceeds with YACHT. Could we encourage you to make use of this opportunity - they are very fine trees delivered to your door. What could be better!

Also we would wish to advise that while we had intended a St Andrews Night Dinner we have realised that was too ambitious, not only on committee resources but also on the appetite for such an event at that time. So the Guild have very kindly agreed to swop dates with us: they will hold their fundraiser at the end of November to allow us to have a YACHT Burns Supper on Saturday 28th January 2017 - so save that date - with more details to come.

As we continue to emphasise, the events we hold will not raise sufficient funds to meet our 5 year YACHT target of £500,000. We launched the campaign in September 2014 and the present projections would indicate that if pledges are honoured we would raise £300,000 of the target amount by the end of the 5 year period. So with that shortfall we would call on you to consider renewing your commitment to the campaign. It may be that you give on a yearly basis - if so then this is a reminder that we have entered another fundraising year. Alternatively, you may wish to give a monthly amount. The appropriate forms are still in the vestibule so that donations may be made and Gift Aid recovered.

National Youth Assembly

The National Youth Assembly (NYA) took place this year from the 19th to the 22nd of August at Gartmore House. This was my tenth and final assembly, and the beginning of my year as Clerk to the NYA. Add in my birthday, and it made for quite a special year. The NYA is a platform for young adults to voice their opinions and actively participate in decision making within the Church of Scotland. Councils and committees of the Church were approached earlier in the year for discussion topic suggestions. The three chosen this year were Gender Justice, Mental Health, and Future of Ministry and Fresh Expressions.

Andrew MacPherson, the Youth Moderator, and I arrived a day early to help with set-up and to re-familiarise ourselves with the venue. On Saturday Andrew and I went to Stirling Station to meet delegates and take them back to Gartmore by coach. Upon arrival, the delegates registered and were greeted by their Small Group Leaders. The ice-breaker challenge on the Friday took on a fiendish zombie-themed escape room challenge before having dinner together then our opening session with worship. We heard from the previous year's youth reps about the work they had been doing over the year, with a report from Hannah-Mary, the outgoing Moderator. Cat, our outgoing Clerk sent us a video message. The Small Groups met after the session while Andrew and I took time to go round and meet delegates.

Each morning there were prayers before breakfast, and full assembly worship following breakfast leading into the discussion input for the day. On the Sunday morning, we all walked down to Gartmore Parish Church to share in their Sunday service.

The discussion input for each topic was designed to give the delegates information about the topic and to pose questions to facilitate discussion whose results were collated to aid the youth reps in taking forward the discussions throughout the year. Our Gender Justice discussion on the Saturday was split into two parts, both with input from Katherine Gilmour and Fiona Buchanan from Christian Aid. We concluded our final discussion of the day with a reflective worship, and finished off the evening with a ceilidh.

After dinner on the Saturday we had a Meet the Moderator session with the Rt Rev Dr Russell Barr, during which Andrew and some friends had kindly arranged to embarrass me with birthday cards, cupcakes and a rousing rendition of Happy Birthday. Our topic for Sunday was Mental Health,. We heard from MSP Maureen Watt who is the Scottish Government Minister for Mental Health. Following on from the Meet the Moderator session, we had a series of reflective activities for delegates to participate in as we recognised that the topic of Mental Health had been a very personal, and at times difficult one for many people that day. We closed the evening with communion, and had planned on having a bonfire. However the weather conspired against us.

On Monday, the topic was Future of Ministry and Fresh Expressions. The delegates

Whose Church?

I had just finished a school assembly and was heading for the exit. I was passing a very small group of children in the corridor when one girl who attended our Sunday Club looked at me and said: "You go to my church." What a classic!

But this amusing anecdote raises an important and significant question: Whose Church is it anyway? The answer? The Church is neither that girl's nor yours nor mine. The Church belongs to Jesus. He is the supreme head of the Church. He gives the new life in the Spirit to the church. He is the one on whom the Church totally depends for the continuance of its life – local and universal. He is to be given the preeminent place in the Church – the preeminent place that is rightfully his. Jesus has the supremacy over every area of the Church's faith and life, worship and service.

So Jesus is in charge – but not in a bossy, bullying way. He doesn't lord it over us. He wants our worship, witness and service to be an expression of our love for him, our gratitude to him and our trust in him, all given ungrudgingly.

But how can we be sure we are doing what Jesus wants and not just doing our own thing or getting on our own hobby horses? If we want to do Church the Jesus way, then we need to be in daily contact with him through prayer, Bible study and then prayer again. We also need regularly to pray and study the Bible with others. We need not only to be connected to Jesus, but also to be in tune with him, not only to be connected to each other, but also to be in tune with each other.

But this anecdote raises another important

and significant question: What do you mean by Church? Some of us would say 'the Church of Scotland', the denomination of which we are part. Others of us would say 'the building in Braidburn Terrace', the building we worship in week by week. Still others of us would say 'the people who meet there', the people we worship with and serve with week by week. While others still would say 'God's holy church throughout the world'. What would you say? Would you focus on one or a combination?

Great tomes have been written about this. so we're barely scratching the surface. But I would like to suggest that going by the Bible, the supreme guidebook, the Church is first and foremost God's holy church throughout the world, made up of all those who acknowledge Jesus as Lord, all those who share the risen life of Christ, from every nation, from every language and from every denomination. I hope you share my excitement at being part of this huge family that spans the earth, reaches into remote areas and crosses frontiers. Wow! Going by the Bible, a Church is a group of Christians in a particular area who regularly meet together to worship, to share communion, to study the Bible, to pray and to serve. They also acknowledge that they are part of this huge, worldwide family. For the first centuries Christians met in each others' homes - then there weren't 'church buildings' as we know them today.

The emphasis is on people who follow Jesus.

I am the church, you are the church, we are the church together. All who follow Jesus, all around the world, Yes, we're the church together.
