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From the Minister



One of the attractions of the Greenbank congregation when I was engaged in the application process for the post of minister, was the extent to which the kirk session, nominating committee and congregation had dug deep into thinking about their priorities for the next chapter of their shared story.

The process of consultation and discussion often begins when a new minister comes. Here, it had already started, so I felt that I was arriving as a character in the middle of a chapter rather than being introduced onto a blank page.

One of the benefits of this is that I have been encouraged and indeed expected to quickly be engaged in further strategic discussion and planning, and to make some decisions and recommendations about key areas of our life. One of those is our worship pattern.

A key question for any new minister is "what is good and life-giving about worship

here, and is God able to speak powerfully through it to the wide range of people who come to Greenbank?" I am glad to say that I have been extremely encouraged by the depth of spirituality that I have encountered here. There is much that nurtures and sustains us already.

The kirk session approved my proposals contained in a paper on worship development that I presented to the last meeting, so I would like to take the chance to outline some key features of what will be happening in the near future:

- Summer worship: there will be one "Summer Service" at 10am throughout the summer running from 24th June, until the Holiday Club service on Sunday 12th August, which will see us return to 10.30am. The summer services will take place in the church, will be around 45–50 minutes in length, and will be shaped to engage all ages in our church family. Crèche will run as usual on each Sunday, and there will be coffee after the service in the hall.
- **Regular Sunday morning worship** outwith the summer services will remain at 10.30am, continuing our "blended" approach of contemporary and traditional influences.
- Quarterly Communion Sundays (from September 2018) will now feature:
 - 9.30am All age Communion service in the Centenary Hall

10.30am Traditional Communion in the church

3pm Afternoon Communion in the Braid Room

• A new Quiet Communion service will be held at 9.30am on the third Sunday of every month except June and July in the Braid Room. This service is designed to be reflective and peaceful, offering a contrasting mood to our other communion celebrations.

- 9.30am Communion services in the Braid Room at Easter and Pentecost, as at present.
- 9.30am First Sunday services in the Centenary Hall during some months, created and led by members of the congregation through particular groups in our congregation, such as The Guild and the Monday Bible Study group.

Some of this looks familiar, other aspects are slightly different. The thinking is to provide a wider range of worship styles and opportunities to create more ways in which God can feed and nourish us, and those who we aim to draw to God in this place in the future.

I was extremely encouraged by the support of the session, and particularly the way in which our elders have been willing to support proposals which might seem risky. God's mission for us is always risky to some extent, but I hope that you will sense that we have the wellbeing and growth of this congregation at heart. We need your support to make the most of these new developments. In all that we are doing across the board at Greenbank, we are seeking to discern how this place can be one of powerful encounter, strong community, and where everyone from babes in arms to our much loved senior members may find a place of nurture, rest, inspiration and growth: a place where the words of Jesus, "love one another, as I have loved you" may be a reality.

Rest assured that you have my love and gratitude for all of you.

Every Picture Tells a Story

If that saying is true, the pictures of the Farewell Concert (see page 9) for our organist Alan Irvine tell a whole book of stories. In capturing the enjoyment of one evening in the life of Greenbank Church these pictures reflect the 14 happy and fruitful years in which we have enjoyed Alan's musical leadership of our worship.

Church organists are very hard to find, especially ones that will take charge of a choir like ours! In 2004 we searched in The Scotsman, Life and Work and the organists' professional journal but the miracle was that we found Alan right under our noses, or at any rate in the choir and occasionally at our own organ. At the time Alan saw himself as a stop-gap. He asked the Kirk Session to keep up the search for a permanent candidate, and to re-examine the position every three years. Well, thanks to collective amnesia, that re-examination was quietly overlooked and 13 years went by until Alan announced last May that he would retire at the end of the choir season in May 2018. It is not publicly recorded (though Alan may have done so) how many services Alan has played for, nor the number of hymns, nor anthems, nor voluntaries, nor introits, nor seasonal recessionals (think Danny Boy, Ae Fond Kiss, Land of our Fathers or those that marked some outcome at Murrayfield). Weddings, funerals, special





events, carol parties, Burns Suppers (but that's another tale (or tail)) – all have benefitted from Alan's faith, dedication, commitment, sense of humour and love of music. Thousands of hours of preparation at the organ console and hundreds of hours wielding the choir master's notional or real baton have all given great inspiration to our worship. Three Ministers, one locum (twice over), and Ministerial Assistants have all enjoyed their partnership with Alan, the choir have gone from strength to strength and the organ itself has benefitted from his attention to its needs.

But all good things must come to an end and so it is with Alan's service as our organist. Joan and his family have waited patiently for more of his company and maybe his golf will now improve. We thank him for the music and hope to enjoy his fellowship amongst us for many years to come and, maybe, again hear his voice in the choir or even his fingers on the keyboard.



Eco Column

The Church Eco Group is pushing on with plans for 'greening up' the area in front of the church and hall doors. The latest design includes benches and planters in the area between the main church door and the noticeboards on the western corner of the buildings.

A possible relocation of the bike racks to the zone between the hall and church doors, and the shift of the bins away from the hall frontage are also being considered.

The main landscape features will be a large planter with a tree and bench surrounds in the centre of the square, other benches and planters, a water butt area, and some ground level planting behind the low wall on the pavement edge. Recycled timber options for the planters are being looked into and costed, and a plants list is being drawn up.

A Puzzle and Regrets

On the 26th September 1945 my family went to watch the Victory Parade along Princes Street. I remember asking why there was a lady leading an Army contingent. I can see her yet! Today that does happen, then it was unheard of.

Sixty years later, at a funeral, I heard that the lady was my friend Mary Millar, a trim, pleasant, but reserved lady, with whom I played Bridge. Despite, over fourteen years, struggling to gain facts about her army life, with many possible stories she might have had to tell, my latest information does not give me much confirmation. Visiting her in her Care Home, I never thought to say "What did you do in the War Mary?" How I wish I had.
