Minister's Letter

Dear Friends



I've just about recovered from the jet lag caused by my trip to Pittsburgh, but the impressions of that trip remain strong...

- Arriving in the States the day after the Presidential Inauguration...
- Internal flights filled to capacity with people, particularly women, who had been joining marches all over the country...
- Concerns in the Churches about discrimination on the grounds of race or religion...
- A more subdued and uncertain air than last year...
- The supportive environment of Seminary and peer group...
- The daily worship services in the seminary chapel including several passionate sermons by African-American preachers... (I have to confess that I didn't go to the service where the congregation were encouraged to respond to the Word of God by participating in yoga moves – so you don't need to worry too much there!)

And of course there are the personal feelings that accompany this stage of the course...

- A sadness that this was the last teaching block of the DMin and the last time when our peer group will meet together (unless we all manage to complete our projects in time for graduation in Pittsburgh in 2018!) ...
- A sense of anticipation as I look forward to an elective – 10 days in the Netherlands at the beginning of March looking at how congregations there are responding to secularism...
- Gratitude to the Church of Scotland for a generous study leave scheme that not only allows ministers two weeks a year but allows that leave to be accumulated to enable us to participate in a programme like this...
- Appreciation of the willingness of Peter Graham to cover for me so that I know that everything is well taken care of in my absence...
- The interest which many of you have shown in the programme...
- And most of all a sense of blessing and a renewal of calling in the return to academic study after twenty years in ministry...

And then of course there is still the ongoing challenge of ascertaining where the future of that ministry lies...

We live in turbulent times. Sometimes the uncertainties are the big issues over which we seem to have little or no control. At other times the uncertainties we experience come much closer to home and faith is sorely tested. And I'm reminded of the question posed by the BB hymn, "*Will your* *anchor hold in the storms of life?*[°] And the answer given by the chorus of that hymn:

We have an anchor that keeps the soul Steadfast and sure while the billows roll Fastened to the rock which cannot move Grounded firm and deep in the Saviour's love.

It is my prayer that you may know the blessing of God's love in the midst of the storms that you encounter in this life.



Each session will last for around an hour.

"Rowan Williams at his simplest is a joy" said one reviewer of the book, which besides questions has reflections to stimulate discussion. There is no requirement to have a copy, nor indeed to have read it before coming to a meeting, but copies have been available for purchase on Sunday mornings, and will be available again on **Sunday 12th March**.

The book, which costs £8.99, is also available at the Cornerstone Bookshop next to St John's Church in Lothian Road.

Christian Aid Week 14–20 May 2017



For Christian Aid, 2016 was one of the most challenging years in recent history. However, the organisation is happy to report that it responded to the challenges, with the help of its many supporters. In 2017, it will continue vital partnership work in close to 40 countries around the world. The 60th anniversary of Christian Aid Week will be celebrated alongside some fantastic new events. This is where you come in once again. Christian Aid week may seem far away, but preparation work is starting now and we need a team of collectors to cover all the streets in the parish. Thanks again to those who collected last year and I hope that most of you will also collect this year. I shall be contacting you over the next few weeks but for anyone who is thinking of 'retiring' as a collector and/or has already booked a holiday for the above dates I would be very grateful if you could "ask a friend" to take over your houses, preferably before I speak to you!

I know that I will need some new collectors to share the load. Please contact me if

you would like to play a part in this important and rewarding mission, which has always been strong in Greenbank. It takes up to about an hour to deliver the envelopes and about 3 hours collection time through the week. Most people do this over 2 early evening slots and sometimes couples take on an area together. A Collector's Guide with plenty of useful information is provided to each helper.

Last year's total for the house-to-house collection amounted to $\pounds 4,265$. Gift Aid, although slightly less than the previous year, still helped to gain extra income over and above what was put into the envelopes. Again, I am very grateful for all the support and help you gave me. I am, as always, looking for administrative help nearer the time to assist me in preparing the bags/envelopes for collectors and also for counting up on the 21st May, after the main service. 

What are you taking up for Lent?

A few days after you receive this edition of Greenbank Connections we'll be in the season of the Christian year called Lent. This year, Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, is on 1st March. But what is Lent about?

Most of us will have heard people talking about what they are giving up for Lent – normally something they relish, like milk chocolate or a glass of wine, or something they really enjoy doing. But Lent isn't a killjoy thing that is all about taking the champagne bubbles out of life. No, we give up something we enjoy so that we can concentrate on God, on glorifying him, on enjoying him for ever and on finding out how enjoying God works in our lives. So it's about getting our priorities back in focus and clearing the dross out of our thoughts, words and deeds.

So if we are to give up something we really enjoy so that we can really enjoy God, how does that work? This brings us back to the second vow of Church membership: "I promise to be faithful in reading the Bible and in prayer." If we're really to enjoy God, then we have to spend, not the odd 5 minutes here and there, but quality time with him every day – listening to what he is saying to us through the Bible and sharing with him what's on our minds and in our hearts. And the more we discover about who God is and what he is like, the greater our enjoyment of him will be.

I've already suggested that Lent is about giving something enjoyable up so that we can take something more enjoyable up. It was John Bell of the Iona Community who took this idea further, saying that in Lent we need to move away from the "giving up" idea to the "taking up" idea. Taking up care and concern, not only for the huge international, national, political and social issues facing us, but for the people who are caught up in them and sometimes damaged by them. Taking up compassion so that care and concern is translated into action to make a different, better and more just and peaceful world and nation. Taking up working with others to achieve this different world.

So what are you giving up for Lent?... and, even more important, what are you taking up for Lent?
