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Minister's Letter

Dear Friends



In my last letter I explained that I had accepted an invitation to preach for the linked congregations of Barthol Chapel and Tarves in Aberdeenshire. I did this on 2nd April and I am pleased to say that all went well. I have now received and accepted the call and Thursday 18th May has now been fixed as a provisional date for the service of induction. The date is provisional because the call still has to be sustained by Gordon Presbytery at their meeting on 2nd May, but as all the usual requirements have now been or are in the process of being met, we are not anticipating any problems. This means that I will be finishing at Greenbank on Sunday 7th May to allow time for us to move house and for me to prepare to take up the responsibilities of a new and very different ministry.

It will be good to be together with Sean again and I am looking forward to returning to the north-east and getting to know the congregations of Tarves and Barthol Chapel. However at the same time I am sad to be leaving Greenbank. You have taught me so much. Your vision for the future, your commitment to young people, your energy and enthusiasm for the work of Christ's church are inspiring, and it has been a privilege to be your minister. However even as I believe God is calling me to serve elsewhere. I'm sure that even now someone is being prepared to journey with you into a new stage in your congregational life together.

In some ways it seems very appropriate that I should be writing this letter on this particular weekend. It is Easter and Easter is, after all, about ending and beginning, death and resurrection. From that so final end of Jesus' life on Good Friday, we move on Easter Sunday to the rolling away of the stone and the discovery of an empty tomb. We hear the Easter acclamation of faith. *"He is not here! He is risen! Hallelujah!"* Meanwhile in the darkness of an empty tomb the God of love has worked a miracle of forgiveness, resurrection and new life.

And we are invited to look at this Easter event through the eyes of faith and see that this miracle is not for Jesus' benefit, but rather that it has significance for the whole of creation. As the theologian, William Willimon writes, "On Easter morning we stand upon the precipice of a strange and wonderful, although confusing and badly shaken new world." And so as I sit in the midst of the sorting and clearing, and the office shredder is red hot, and boxes of books disappear to the Christian Aid Bookstall – all these signs of an ending – I give thanks that for all of us Easter also contains within it God's promise of a new beginning. With warmest wishes.

Annual Business Meeting Sunday 19th March 2017

The Minister constituted the meeting with prayer.

Preses of the Congregational Board, Roddy Morrison, chaired the meeting. He thanked all those who work hard for the Board, including Property Convener, David Allan and the Work Squad (volunteers from the Congregation) for all the

property improvements during 2016. Also thanked were Gillian Sweetman (Health, Safety and Security Convener), Angus McLachlan (Fire Safety Adviser), Alan Armit (Halls Convener), Alan Ramage (Clerk to the Board), Joshua Manyao (Beadle), Mirek Pociask (Church Caretaker/Handyman), Brian Webster (Church Cleaner) and Ginny Johnston (Church Administrator). The Preses thanked all the members of the Board, and asked for volunteers to serve on the Board or help with the Work Squad.

David Allan reported that the generosity of the congregation for the *Light a Light* appeal had enabled the Church to convert all the lights in the Centenary building to LEDs, well beyond what was thought possible. However replacing lights in the Lower Hall led to its being redecorated by the Work Squad.

The intelligent heating system has been a great success. It took time to iron out the early teething difficulties but it was close to operating at maximum efficiency.

All the emergency lights in the Centenary and Hub buildings had to be replaced at a cost of $\varepsilon 6,000$ following a complete failure.

The new Eco-Congregation Group had been an excellent innovation. It had identified many opportunities for saving en-

ergy. David Jack wrote a monthly column in Connections and the group had set out a challenging agenda for itself.

Last November, it was discovered that £13,000 worth of unexpected stonework repairs were required urgently. The tower on the Main Hall (the original Church building) is rotten and needs at least temporary demolition at a cost of around £10,000. Replacing it could cost £39,000. The tower function as part of the ventilation system is now redundant, and so the Property Committee was currently in discussion with Presbytery, the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland and Edinburgh City Council Planning and Building Control Departments to see whether it must be rebuilt or not. The spire above the church has been painted to avoid a repeat of the Tower.

The Property Convener thanked the members of his Committee and the Church staff for their help and hard work.

The Treasurer, John Ritchie, spoke to the Management accounts for the year to 31st December 2016 which had been distrib-

uted. The Statutory Accounts which go to the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator were with the independent examiner at present. The total ordinary income of the Church in 2016 had been £269,531 which was a reduction of £18,120 on the previous year. The Treasurer was concerned, and he drew the congregation's attention to the costs for 2017 which were estimated at £270,000. The tax recovered by gift aid had amounted to £49,643. The gift aid recovery was undertaken by Michael Struthers assisted by Alan Ramage. Other general income had amounted to £40,372 and included income from congregational organisations and charges for the use of the halls including the Pre-School and Nile Grove. The largest expense had been £143,545 for Ministries and Mission paid to the Church of Scotland and Presbytery dues paid to the Presbytery of Edinburgh. This contribution paid for the minister and contributed to the wider work of the Church. Local Staffing was the pay costs of the church administrator, the caretaker/handyman, the church cleaner, the organist, the beadle and the costs of ministerial assistance. This had amounted to £50,385. The Youth Minister's salary was charged to the YACHT fund.

The Treasurer thanked his predecessor Robert Young for his help and also the Assistant Treasurers, Michael Struthers and Kathryn Sangster, and Alan Ramage for their help.

The Preses announced that after discussion the Board had selected the Open Door for the Lent Appeal. He thanked the Elders retiring from the Board having served their term: Ian Thom, Robert Young, Helen Barnes, Margot Fergusson, and Donald Macleod, and those retiring on becoming elders: Carrie Reid, Ulrike Buchan and Lyndsay Kennedy. David Ferguson, Susan Inch, John Rutherford, Stuart Sanders and Keith Winton had been appointed as Kirk Session representatives on the Board for three years. Tony Foster had been nominated to the Board. The congregation approved.

The Minister expressed warm appreciation to the Preses, Roddy Morrison, for his role in leading the Board. The meeting concluded with a prayer of commitment.

Tales from the Jumble Sale 2017



Another year and our principal annual fund raiser has again been hugely successful providing almost £9,000 for Scout Group funds. So where does it go? Rather like the Church finances it is, unfortunately, largely spoken for, but with our other fund raising and subscriptions it enables us to meet central levies to the District, Area, Scottish and National Scout Associations (now over £4,000), maintain equipment (tents are replaced every 12 years), fund training (this year the Leaders undertook the outdoor first aid course at a cost of £900) cover administration costs and substantial donations to the Church as a contribution to costs and to Yacht. Outings now need to be self financing but we try and subsidise transport costs.

With the huge input over 7 days from well over 150 people on different days the Jumble Sale is not actually very cost effective but with the involvement of everyone from 6 to 76, the uniformed members, parents, friends of the Group and Church members we also view this as a social event for everyone either involved or a supporter. Our collections were down from previous years through competition from the increasing number of Charity shops and commercial operators so it was a relief that profits held up. Our thanks to all involved.

Unsold items in saleable condition were collected / delivered direct to charity shops and not sold to commercial operators. Morningside charity stores were largely full!, so we had to look further afield with Bethany, Shelter and (thanks to the efforts of Angus) the Salvation Army taking these. We seem to be coming (sadly) to the last of the Spanish souvenirs from the 60s and Pyrex dishes are clearly an endangered species. Bric à Brac continues to astound but glassware was down and sherry glasses have joined the long list, cassette tapes, LPs, videos, cameras (without a phone) whose former purpose (Sherry?) has to be explained to our younger members. Paintings, Prints, Handbags! and Jewellery are all growing items.

All stalls however from electrical to clothing / household to sports and toys, books and baking, outdoor and gardening and all the others all substantially contribute.



Vacancy News

This is the first regular update (longer than I expect others to be) about our vacancy which will start officially on **18th May** when **Alison Swindells** is inducted into her new charge in Aberdeenshire.

There will be a farewell lunch and presentation for Alison on **Sunday 7th May** when she will preach for the last time as our Minister. If you have not yet signed up for that you can still do so via the website or by contacting the Church Office

I hope some Greenbank members will be able to travel to Aberdeenshire to support Alison at her induction on the evening of 18th May. If you wish more information please get in touch with me.

Presbytery The of Edinburgh has appointed the Rev Jamie Griggs of St Anne's Church in Corstorphine to be our Interim Moderator. In this role he is the interface between the congregation and the Presbytery. In preparation for Alison's departure our own Kirk Session has invited the Rev Dr John Stevenson to take on the role of locum once again as he did so ably when Ian Scott retired. John will lead most of our worship and carry out pastoral responsibilities. The Rev Peter Graham will continue as our Associate. He, too, will visit members and take some services - as he does now. Steve Chaffee completes the team as Youth Associate.

We do not know how long it will be until we have a new Minister. However, with a strong Ministerial team and the full support of the Kirk Session, all aspects of the life of the congregation will continue. There will be opportunities for members to help out and I hope you will respond as requests come up.

I will now outline a few of the early stages in the vacancy procedure. Quite soon the Congregation will be involved in appointing a Nominating Committee from our membership to look for someone to recommend as our next Minister. That may involve an election so we will need to create an electoral register of all our existing members and other people who worship regularly and are not members of other congregations. There will be formal announcements about that on two Sundays in the near future - but if you're not already a member and want to be included on the list you should contact the church office now and ask for the form to fill in.

The Kirk Session will soon be preparing a profile of the parish and congregation. This will give a full statement of the life, work and witness of the congregation and parish and our vision and plans for the future to help prospective candidates get a "feel" for our situation. If you would like more information about any of these processes or other matters about the vacancy I suggest you contact your District elder or come directly to me.

I know you will all want to join me in wishing Alison every blessing as she moves to her new charge and to thank her for her leadership, love and devotion at Greenbank over the last 10 years.

Remember the people of Alexandria and Tanta

On Palm Sunday, we heard the terrible news of bombings targeting Coptic Christians in Alexandria and Tanta, Egypt.

In Tanta, about 60 miles North of Cairo, during the church service a man walked in and placed a heavy bag under a seat near the altar and walked out. Soon after a bomb exploded. 29 were killed including the priest and the choir, 75 were wounded. Hours later in Alexandria, a suicide bomber exploded himself outside a church, killing 16 and wounding 33.

Rev Ian Alexander, Secretary to the Church of Scotland World Mission

Council, has sent messages of condolence to Protestant Churches in Egypt and to Pope Tawadros II of the Coptic Orthodox Church in Egypt, in the wake of the attacks. Pope Tawadros II was in the cathedral conducting a service at the time of the attack.

Coptic Christians make up about 10% of Egypt's population and have suffered other bombings in December 2016. Coptic churches and homes have been set on fire, members of the Coptic minority have been physically attacked, and their property has been looted according to *Amnesty International*.

Pilgrimage

In 2015, my brother John had hiked *almost* all of the Appalachian Trail. He met the final mountain, called Katahdin, on the last day of the hiking season, and it greeted him with a blizzard. He vowed to return. In June 2016, I flew back to the US and we ascended Katahdin. After the better part of a six hour hike we reached the summit. For John, the summit represented many things – the culmination of a 2,200 mile trek to find himself, the end of his pilgrimage, and the start of a new chapter of his life.

Pilgrimage is, of course, an ancient Christian practice. It engages the whole pilgrim and confers many spiritual benefits – but it is also a spiritual *discipline*. Greenbank Parish Church, as you well know, is returning to this ancient practice. Alison is heading to her next charge, and we remain. And we may begin in the next months to undergo a 'spiritual inventory' – to reflect upon where we have been, where we are, and where we are headed.

We forget all too easily that the Church is, in itself, a *pilgriming body*. We are searching the world for God, calling for God and announcing his kingdom. But it is not without significant risk – we are weary pilgrims, and we too often stop for a cuppa or a wee dram and forget to get back on the trail. But it is on the trail we must go.

Katahdin was not *my* hike. It was John's, through and through. It simply could not carry the same spiritual weight for me as it did for John. But Greenbank Parish Church's upcoming hike is *ours*. May we walk together, and contemplate prayerfully how we may best love our neighbour, what parts of our individual and corporate lives require repentance, and what kind of church we want to be *today*.
