Dear Friends,

A Look Over One's Shoulder

It is time to reflect on my church insurance role as I pass on the reins to my successor. Turning the clock back to 1979, on entering the church vestibule I was approached by the then Preses, David Morris, who said 'I have the ideal job for you, Charles'. That is how I took over the role of Greenbank Church insurance representative.

As I look back, I find myself having worked with four Ministers, five Preses, six Treasurers and six Property Convenors; each of these know who they are and have their own memories of me! With email and the internet only making their appearance in the late 1990s, all my early records are by hand.

In September 1978 an assessor evaluated our church building complex for insurance purposes at **£452,000**. The valuation carried out early last year of our very much larger extended building complex was **£13,500,000**. The annual insurance premium is currently £7,812 + insurance premium tax, being the equivalent of VAT. Not only has our church building increased in its size but so many different groups and organisations use our buildings seven days a week.

When most of us deal with everyday insurance (car, home, travel) we are all too often caught out due to 'the small print'. Church Insurance is no different. Our policy

now has a Plain English Summary of Cover which runs to 30 pages; the full policy runs to over 100 pages.

Nowadays we have named Health & Safety as well as Fire Safety representatives all tied in with Risk Assessments. We even require a Dormitory Accommodation risk assessment form to be completed whenever a youth group stays overnight in our church halls!

Some of you may be interested to know about our overall insurance claims made from 1980 to 2018. We have made 43 successful claims (with the inevitable excesses deducted) covering all three Greenbank properties. They fall into the following:

Church /Halls	27
Manse	10
Church flat (Comiston Place)	6

Reflections on Outreach

A sermon preached by the Minister on Sunday 15th September

John 4: 1-15

Matthew 28: 16-20

Last week we began thinking about our *Strategic Plan* and the first section, **Discipleship**. We explored two images, the first of sitting at the feet of Jesus, imbibing what we can learn of the way he thought and lived from the stories of the Bible, and that in this sitting we are like trees at the waterside, putting down our roots to burrow into the riverbank to reach the living water that a relationship with Jesus leads us to. But that sitting, being planted, sends us out again, because we can't resist the implications of the messages of Jesus to get out there in the world, to be alongside the people that need help and affirmation in so many ways. So there's a contemplative and an activist side to discipleship that we also found in the two approaches of Martha and Mary in Luke's Gospel.

Today we move on to think about **Outreach**, and when I had another look over this section of our *Strategic Plan*, I noted that our priorities are very much towards looking out, engagement, but also to bringing people towards us. That, of course, is exactly what the great commission that we heard from the Gospel of Matthew is all about. Going out and nurturing disciples for Christ, hoping that they find a route to God with us here, and baptising them as they profess their faith.

Today's reading from the Gospel of John sets out an altogether different kind of outreach which is very challenging, but which should lie behind all of our actions.

This is a powerful multi-layered story. Here we have Jesus and his disciples heading back from Jerusalem to Galilee on the most direct route, which took them through Samaria. Ah yes, the Samaritans – remember the Good Samaritan, the one who crossed the road to help whilst the other local worthies didn't? We're in his territory now. Why? It wouldn't have been usual for Jews to go that way from Jerusalem to Galilee. There were other "safer" options. And there they were, in the middle of the scorching day, with Jesus having been left to rest whilst the other disciples went off to get provisions from the town, probably the Samaritan capital, Shechem. And where is Jesus? Sitting at the well of the great Patriarch, Jacob. This triggers a scriptural memory of Jacob meeting his future wife Rachel at a well. It reminds us of Abraham's servant meeting Rebekah at a well whilst out searching for a wife for Isaac. It's a reminder of Moses meeting his wife Zipporah. It's all shaping up to be rather symbolic. Something significant is happening here. We are in foreign territory, not secretly but in broad daylight, and right at the heart of the story of the people of Israel, when along comes a woman to draw water. But why is she doing it in the middle of the day? That's not peak water-drawing time. It would more sensibly be done first thing or later in the day. No, this woman is somehow also on the edge of things to be there at that time, not permitted to be around everyone else, although she's not coming to Jesus in secret as Nicodemus did. No, this woman

innocently stumbles onto the scene, and comes face to face with a **rabbi** who actually asks **HER** to give him a drink of water. She can immediately see that he's from the other lot. And a man. And a Rabbi. This is normally such a big deal, and she can't quite believe it. And so we have this slightly comical knock-around, where Jesus speaks of having living water that will quench every thirst, and she can't even work out how he'll give it to her because he's got no bucket. The pair of them are talking past each other as we sit by and enjoy the exchange, seeing what's going on and waiting for it to be worked out.

This story is culturally radical for its time, incendiary even, with so many boundaries

of caste and propriety being crossed in the tale, but certainly hugely symbolic of who Jesus was and what he would do. This was someone who would unite the divisions of the people of Israel just by sitting down alongside them, even though it was one of the more dangerous things that he could have done. The message of this story for us today is that it is part of our discipleship to go out into the world and sit down alongside other people in places that are not ours. Not in our safe zones, but in the places of our communities where people hang out. In the work places, in the schools, in the parks, in all sorts of community and cultural activities. A major part of our mission is to

be with folk who are not Christians. Folk of any faith or culture. And we are to be as Christ to them by getting alongside them and striking up relationships. This is not just for times of crisis, although that is also a time when we should be getting alongside folk in our communities too. This is the work of the disciples, who in the first part of this story are identified as the ones who were going out to do the baptising. ***It wasn't Jesus – his friends were doing it.*** So that's all of us – everyone here is charged with the job of being a disciple of Christ in the world.

What might this involve for you? It might be quite overt. You might actually be very good at having conversations about faith, and hurrah for that, but equally, getting alongside people might never involve an explicit faith conversation. But if you are motivated and driven to show the love of God in Christ by affirming the worth and acceptance of everyone you come across, then that will be enough to show that you are a disciple.

There will be times that the reaching out and being alongside people will have a rather more intense dimension. Many of you will have been aware of local cases of suicide, and the fact that this was suicide prevention week. Some of you will have been aware of the suicide of a very successful and popular young American pastor, Jarrid Wilson, with everything going for him, but bearing the burden of severe depression. What do we have to offer in situations like this? Sometimes we wonder if we have anything, but we still have the mission to sit alongside people who are enduring this and other burdens and affirm their



value and the love that is held for them as children of God. Our very presence alongside them is a part of our outreach and is as significant as the medical support that they will receive. It's a message that says: **hang in there, God loves you and wants you here.**

When we think about outreach like this, it is clearly sometimes demanding, but also rather straightforward. We get ourselves to the places where people who are not part of the church go to. ***So where are those wells for you? Think about that as you go about your lives this week.***

I learned a new song this summer called "We are all just walking each other home."

It's a simple repeating song with the idea that in getting alongside people we are going on the journey of life with them, and back home to God. I love this idea that WE are walking each other home in the way that a courting couple might do. Shyly at first, but growing more deeply connected the more of the walking we do, respectfully and with a hope for closeness. Let's remember this simple but powerful strategy of Jesus as we wonder about where the wells will be for us when we sit down with strangers, become friends, and walk each other home.

Three Generations of Guides Plant More Trees – 84 years on!



Nearly 85 years after planting a cherry tree in Braidburn Valley Park, Anne Morham returned to plant another. Anne was part of the 5,000 strong Guide team in 1935 who planted 400 trees in the shape of the Guide Trefoil to mark the Silver Jubilee of King George V. As some of the trees now need to be replaced, Anne returned in April to do her bit. She was joined in the planting by Ms Elspeth Brown who has been blind from birth and has enthusiastically led many Guides with sight difficulties to reach their potential, and by Eilidh Davidson who is a member of the 162A Guide company in Greenbank Church.

Annual Business Meeting, June 2019

The Preses of the Congregational Board, Roddy Morrison, opened the meeting and noted that the work of the Board's sub-committees had increased not only in respect of Property and Finance but also with the associated issues of Health, Safety and Security (including Fire Safety), Data Protection and environmental matters. The Preses appealed to the congregation for assistance from any members who had expertise in these areas. A Halls Manager post had been created and had been filled by Moira Land to explore better use and co-ordination of Church facilities. Alan Armit would continue to be the point of contact for bookings.

The Preses thanked Charles Black who was standing down after 40 years advising the Church on insurance matters (*see article on p 7*). Susie MacLeod had offered to take over this role. John George had retired after 40 years as a Welcome Team leader and he was thanked for this remarkable service. Susan Jackman, who was to stand down after nine years as Convenor of the Neighbourhood Group, was also thanked for her service. The Preses thanked the members of the two sub-committees (Property and Finance), all office holders on the Board, the members of the Board and the Church's employees for all the work they had done in 2018.

Property

David Allan, the Property Convenor, reported that in 2018 the major project had been the expenditure of around £39,000 on modernising the manse. The other major project last year had been the stripping and sealing of the Centenary Hall floor, its lobbies and the staircase at a cost of over

£5,000. Over the past five years, the Congregational Board had recognised the need for significant additional funding needed to maintain Church buildings. The current year was proving to be very challenging.

2018 Accounts

The Treasurer, John Ritchie, said that income in 2018 (excluding YACHT) had been £243,000, including standing orders, Free Will Offerings, open plate and reclaimed tax. This income total sum was almost the same as in 2017. £30,000 had been received through letting the Church's premises and donations from its own organisations. Two legacies had been received: £1,000 from the late Mrs Elizabeth Shiel and £20,000 from the late Dr John Forrester.

Expenses (excluding YACHT Fund) had amounted to £318,000 in total, made up as follows: Mission & Ministries contribution and the Church's Presbytery dues amounted to £143,000 (45%), local salaries £60,000 (19%), building costs £90,000 (28%) (this had included the costs of refurbishing the manse) and all the other local costs £25,000 (8%).

With regard to funds, the Treasurer concluded by stating that the Fabric Fund stood at £55,000, Legacies and General Fund at £45,000, the YACHT Fund at £208,000 and other funds £8,000.

The Preses thanked both the Property Convenor and the Treasurer for all their hard work, and paid tribute to the work of the Church's Eco-Group, which has achieved the Eco-Congregation Bronze award and is working towards achieving its Silver award.
