

A FOND FAREWELL TO TIM CHALK'S NATIVITY SCENE

In 2003, Sir Tom and Lady Farmer generously gifted the Nativity scene created by the sculptor Tim Chalk to the city of Edinburgh and Edinburgh churches. Reluctantly, it has been decided that this wonderful piece of civic art can no longer weather the elements and is to be retired. Tim Chalk wrote this piece for the occasion especially for our newsletter:

Thoughts on the Edinburgh Nativity's Final Outing



When I made the Edinburgh Nativity Scene in 2003 the brief was to make a sculpture that would last fifteen seasons. Now, after eighteen Christmases it has been reluctantly decided that this should be its last outing.

2003 was also marked by the Second Gulf War and the invasion of Iraq, and while I was designing the scene the Middle East was being turned upside down and families were being destroyed and forced from their homes. I remember saying at the time "This could be a family in Palestine 2000 years ago or last week in Iraq". Without wanting to be overtly political about it this concentrated

my mind on what I felt was central to the Christmas Story; the human story of a family caught up in world events with no ability to influence them but yet carrying the full burden of their consequences. But also, at the heart of the story there is the optimism that accompanies the birth of a child, and the humanity of those reaching out to support others in need.

Now, seventeen years later the world is still in a state of upheaval, people are still homeless and displaced as a result of war or personal misfortune, at home and abroad. But on a positive note, there are still people who care and engage with the issue and I hope my Nativity scene bears witness to this concern.

My aim was that the Nativity should provide a focus for contemplation, and a refuge from the materialism and commercialism of our hectic modern Christmas. When I make an artwork and send it out into the world it is always fascinating to see what happens to it. Some fade back into their surroundings and disappear, others develop a life of their own. It has given me enormous pleasure over the years to see families and individuals stop and spend a few moments or longer, pausing in their busy lives, or even making what sometimes appears to be a special excursion as a family just to visit the Nativity.

Looking to the future I hope the gap left by the departure of this Nativity is filled by another interpretation of the Christmas Story, and, more importantly, the central message of the story is not drowned out by the flashing lights and Special Seasonal Promotions.

EDINBURGH WOMEN'S AID CHRISTMAS APPEAL

Women's Aid is inviting companies, churches, families and individuals to participate in their Christmas Appeal. As has been



widely reported there has been a global increase in instances of domestic abuse this year. More locally, Edinburgh Women's Aid saw an increase of 78% on new referrals to its helpline and core services between the beginning of June and the end of September this year compared to the same period last year. The charity also saw a 69% increase in demand for support for food and essentials this year since the beginning of March compared to last year. This year, because of the pandemic, an increase in demand for their services and lockdown restrictions, the charity is asking companies and groups to club together to both support women and children to have a brighter Christmas but also to provide food and essentials for women and children with no recourse to other funds during 2021. Scottish charity People Know How, have been busy adapting their projects supporting the communities of Edinburgh and East Lothian to online, telephone and socially distant Both their Positive Transitions support. Service supporting children, young people and families, and their Reconnect service supporting adults have moved online, with projects run both via video chat and through a blended model of delivery that combines socially distant support with online sessions. People Know How's projects are now all

delivered via the phone or online. But with such a drastic move to using technology, it quickly became clear that many individuals simply don't have access to digital devices in their homes. This sobering fact gave way to People Know How's Computer Delivery project. Since April, the charity has been refurbishing donated devices and delivering them to members of the community, with over-the-phone tech support available after delivery. This project allows individuals to access support, home-school children and stay in touch with friends and family. Thanks to donations and the support of their volunteers, they have been able to deliver over 700 devices so far and have enough donations to deliver 1,000 by the end of the year. Leading on from the success of this project, People Know How are now leading a campaign for digital inclusion across Scotland.

Do you want to get involved? The charity is currently looking for volunteers, in particular to support adults to improve social isolation and digital skills within their Wellbeing Calls and Learn Digital projects. As many continue to self-isolate to protect themselves during the pandemic, having a friendly ear to chat has become more important than ever. By volunteering as a Wellbeing Caller, you can support adults experiencing loneliness and isolation through just a weekly telephone call.

Or if you know how to use a digital device, you can become a Digital Guide. You'll provide support to our Digital Learners, helping them to complete basic tasks a computer or phone, improving digital skills and reducing social isolation.
