Thought for the Month: Sun and Clouds

My school's hymn was "Summer suns are glowing". The only time I can remember singing it was in the Usher Hall at the concert and prize giving at the end of the school year, in July. It seemed to me that, every year, it ushered in a spell of rain – especially at Cadet camp, which immediately followed the end of term, but also over the summer holidays generally.

I don't know why that hymn had been chosen. Perhaps it was simply appropriate to the end of the summer term. But it has one special significance for young people. Its author, William Walsham How (who also wrote "For all the saints, who from their labours rest"), was a clergyman who, after he became a

bishop in 1879, worked in the East End of London, was particularly fond of children, and was commonly called the "children's bishop".

As a boy, the verses of the hymn which made the biggest impact on me were the first two:

Summer suns are glowing over land and sea; happy light is flowing bountiful and free. Everything rejoices in the mellow rays; all earth's thousand voices swell the psalm of praise. See God's mercy streaming over all the world, and his banner gleaming everywhere unfurled. Broad and deep and glorious as the heaven above.

I enjoyed the optimistic tone, the sense of freedom and the out-doors, the metaphor of the banner, the description of earth as having a thousand voices and of heaven as broad, deep and glorious.

his eternal love.

But the last two verses strike a more sombre note:

Lord, upon our blindness your pure radiance pour; for your loving-kindness make us love you more.
And, when clouds are drifting dark across the sky, then, the veil uplifting, Father, still be nigh.

We will never doubt you, though you veil your light; life is dark without you, death with you is bright. Light of light, shine o'er us on our pilgrim way; still go on before us to the endless day.

Perhaps they resonated less with my teenage mind although, like the first two, I can still sing them from memory. Their imagery is equally powerful – dark clouds drifting across the sky, the brightness of life with God, the pilgrim way. Perhaps they have more significance to me today, later in my pilgrimage. Their theme may be darker. But they have the same positive tone as the first two verses. God's promise of love and guidance is not confined to the days of summer sun, but is a reality also in days when God's guiding light is veiled and when darkness covers the land. As we enjoy a Scottish summer – and life's experiences – of sun and clouds, let us remember His constant presence, in darkness and in light.

Update on Edinburgh Presbytery Plan 2022-2025

This is an updated version of an article I placed in the weekly newsletter on 29th April.

Over 60 people attended the congregational meeting held after morning worship on 24th April. It was moderated by the Rev Dr Anne Logan. There were brief presentations by me, Roddy Morrison, the Property Convener and Preses, and David Jack from the Moderator's Committee who is also one of our strategic leads on Outreach.

I gave a summary of the progress that had been made towards a new Presbytery Plan for Edinburgh since the autumn of 2020. At the beginning there were discussions in local clusters when we were placed with Fairmilehead and Morningside Parish Churches. These resulted in an agreed statement to work more closely together while continuing as three strong independent churches. However all changed in December 2021 when the Presbytery issued a consultation document that placed us in one of seven Mission Districts (South) in a union with Fairmilehead and St. John's Colinton Mains Churches. The union would be served by two full time and one unpaid part-time ministers, a single Kirk Session and no Congregational Board.

David Jack outlined the consultation process and summarised

the discussions that had started with the other churches in the proposed Union. These had been very preliminary. There had also been a brief meeting with Morningside Parish Church which is in the South Mission District too and with whom we have had shared services and events for many years. There had been one meeting between the Interim Moderator and Session Clerk with two members of the Deployment Group that has responsibility for consultations on the Plan within the Presbytery. We were expecting a further and larger meeting with this group before the end of June - this has now been arranged for 8th June. Any changes to the draft Plan will emerge over the summer before the Presbytery votes on it in October.

The Property Convener summarised the approaches he had had about the condition of all our property which went over similar ground to other recent property reviews. He reported that there were no plans for church closures in our union group.

There were many questions and comments from the floor covering matters such as:

 The lack of logic in the choice of churches for the proposed union, and of explanation for the move from the previous cluster with Morningside and Fairmilehead to the new union group;

- That progressive youth work took place between St John's Colinton Mains and Craiglockhart Churches;
- The status of our property church and manse; (For information the Church and Halls are vested with the Church of Scotland, the manse with the congregation);
- The decision-making process in Presbytery and General Assembly, noting that it is the whole Presbytery, not a committee of it, that would vote on the plan; and it is the General Assembly, not committees of it, that would take the final decisions:
- Particular concerns because we had no permanent Minister whereas the others we had been meeting all had ministers in place with unrestricted tenure;
- That there was a flaw in the voting arrangements for unions and ministers set out in legislation. (This was acknowledged by the Presbytery. They are now consulting the Law Department);
- That there had apparently been no regard given to types of congregation of theological positions;
- It was recognised that the Presbytery has a difficult task and we would do well to offer constructive solutions (though where we had tried to do so these had not

been accepted);

 That the timeframe of a plan to 2025 did not look far enough ahead.

We now await the next meeting with the Deployment Group and have plans to meet again with the other churches in the proposed union and with Morningside. The debates on church reform at the General Assembly could be interesting too – stay tuned. We will arrange another meeting for the congregation when the time seems best.

World Church and the General Assembly

By the time you read this the 2022 General Assembly* may be over and you will be able to follow up on the proceedings. Below I have detailed just a few items of interest to the World Church Group, and much more can be found in The Church of Scotland Faith Impact Forum's wide-ranging report** to the assembly.

- The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland is invited to welcome an historic Declaration of Friendship with the Catholic Church in Scotland that offers 'a decisive and irrevocable statement of our friendship with one another, based on our shared faith in Christ.' It is the culmination of more than 100 years of ecumenical relationship-building between the two Churches (see photo*).
- Commissioners are asked to approve a new Jewish-Christian

glossary, which defines some of the key terms used in both religions and what they mean to people from each tradition. Ministers and rabbis worked together on the project, focusing on: 'terms and words that either directly or implicitly convey beliefs and attitudes to the politics and theology of land.' The glossarv is intended to benefit its users through learning more about both their own and the other faith, by discovering key similarities and differences between the faiths and by offering a new way to approach 'and express hopes and prayers for peace and justice in Israel in Palestine.'

Churches in Britain and Ireland are asked to support the Korean Peace Appeal*** and efforts by seven faith groups on the peninsula to end the Korean War by collecting

Gift Aid: A Big Thank You

During 2021 Greenbank Church (a registered Charity) recovered Gift Aid in excess of £46,000 as a result of donations from our generous members and supporters. Many thanks to everyone who contributed to this magnificent achievement! This income represents a significant uplift to the Church's finances and helps us as a congregation better to fulfil our Mission, particularly during the current troubled times. Gift Aid is good Stewardship and going forward it is important that, wherever possible, individually we maximise the value of our donations.

With the present basic rate of income tax of 20%, the Church can recover tax on donations at the rate of 25% – at no additional cost to the donor!

So: £4 becomes £5; £20 becomes £25; £100 becomes £125 and so on....

Who is eligible to give through Gift Aid?

Anyone who pays Income Tax or Capital Gains Tax. The amount of gift aid claimed can only be equal to or less than the tax paid.

Other key features of Gift Aid are:

- No minimum contribution is required
- No particular amount has to be promised
- There is no fixed term during which contributions must be made.

Donations given by a means which identifies the donor are of greater value to the Church compared to "open plate" donations. Donations can be made by various methods, including: standing order (the most popular); cash if in offering envelopes; cheques; payroll giving. Other digital means are increasingly becoming available. During 2020 we introduced an online donation facility which is accessible via the Church website, and in 2021 a contactless terminal was brought into use as an alternative to cash giving after Sunday services.

To help us and ensure compliance with the Gift Aid rules please check the following:

If you currently do not give through Gift Aid and are eligible please consider signing a Gift Aid Declaration.

If you do currently Gift Aid your donations, check that you are still paying as much or more tax than the amount of Gift Aid claimed on your donations, or if you are no longer a tax payer or are paying insufficient tax to cover the standard Gift Aid claim on your donations, please inform the Gift Aid Administrator at

If you wish more information (including blank Declarations for completion) or assistance on any of the above, please get in touch.

Peat Free Compost

Many gardeners avoid using peat in order to save not only British peatlands, but those of Poland and Scandinavia. I prefer compost made from bark, wood and wool fibres rather than coir to reduce the carbon footprint from transport from the tropics. There are a number of excellent Peat-Free composts available.

You may have to water more often, but using less water each time, to produce happy, healthy and bountiful crops.

Closing The Loop

In order for recycling to be an effective means of waste reduction we need to "close the loop" by making conscious choices to use products made from recycled materials. Here are some of my favourite examples: a while ago my sister gave me an extremely soft and cosy cashmere neck-warmer, made by Turtle Doves. They offer a range of recycled cashmere products and you can send them unwanted jumpers and receive a pair of gloves in exchange, subject to certain conditions.

For my regular swims I purchased a Speedo cap to protect my hair from chlorine. I chose one made from recycled material which is very easy to put on and comfortable to wear. To carry my wet swimming things, I may buy a tote bag made from a bouncy castle by Wyatt & Jack, a UK-based sustainable brand, creating bags and accessories from salvaged bouncy castles, deckchair canvas and inflatables. I have previously sent them a small inflatable dinghy under their Inflatable Amnesty® scheme.

The local Easter Greens store collects bottle tops and other hard plastic items of types 2 (HDPE), 4 (LDPE) & 5 (PP). The plastic is used to make various new



products, such as soap dishes and combs, by Doba Studio in London Road, Edinburgh, part of the Precious Plastic universe, a global community ecosystem collaborating on plastic recycling.

The Guild also collect bottle tops in the box, clearly labelled, beside the "stamps" pillar box and the ink cartridge box on the shelf just inside the church door.

They are processed into minute balls used in the fibre optics industry. They earn £200 per tonne (only 1.5 million tops!) and many thousands of pounds have gone to charities which support palliative care.

It is such a simple thing to do so maybe you could join the Greenbank collectors? The only acceptable tops have 2, 4, 02 or 04 enclosed in a triangle inside the top and the Guild are happy to receive them, washed and dried.

We will all have our own different ways of closing the loop but together we can achieve great things.

We are so grateful to everyone who contributed jumble, who worked on collecting and sorting the jumble, who staffed the stalls on the day and who helped deliver the leftovers to charity shops - as well as those behind all the planning that went into this event.

We were overwhelmed with donations and astonishingly, and regret-

fully, had to stop collections on the Thursday. Parents and members of the Congregation did an amazing job of delivering surplus goods to Charity shops the following week so nothing useful would go to waste. You may have read about the new Edinburgh Community Bookshop, a second hand bookstore that raises money each month for a different Charity. We were pleased to assist them by giving them our surplus books (some 150 boxes) following which the bookstore was able to open and sell its first book.

We are now in a stronger financial position and will be able to catch up on equipment renewals and replacement and ensuring outdoor activities and camps can be supported to reduce costs to our many young members. Stuart Sanders
