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#### Minister's Letter



#### **Bread**

The news of war and suffering continues to burden our hearts. We come to the Communion Table next on the Third Sunday in Lent (3rd March), for the bread and wine that will help sustain us through these difficult times. As my son, Max, informed me when he was three years old, "Communion bread feeds our hearts."

The Bread of Life (John 6:35) is not just for Communion Sunday. Remember the manna that fell from the sky and fed the wandering and wondering Israelites as they followed Moses through the wilderness. Would they ever find the Promised Land? In the book of Exodus, Moses told his people that God would provide for them, and God did.



We pray the Lord's Prayer every Sunday, but it, too, is not meant to be kept in the sanctuary, only to be dusted off for Sundays. The line, "Give us this day our daily bread" (Matthew 6:11), from the Lord's Prayer is an invitation to pray every day. It speaks of gratitude in the understanding that as living creatures on this earth, we need food to sustain us. As spiritual creatures, we need the Living Bread for our souls. God provides both.

As we bite into our toast, or scone, or bacon roll, let us remember to give thanks for that of the earth which gives us nourishment. Let us also give thanks for the hands

involved in the growing, making, baking, packaging and selling of the bread.

God travels with us through highs and lows and especially through the wilderness. May we never forget that God provides for us, and that God calls on us to help provide for others. As we journey through Lent, let us reflect: Have we broken bread today? Did we give thanks? Whom can we invite to the Lord's Table to break bread with us?

### **Presbytery Mission Plan (PMP)**

Following the February Connections update by our Interim Moderator there is little further to report for March. Greenbank Session met with representatives from Presbytery's Deployment Committee in January where we were able to exchange views and ask questions. St John's Colinton Mains Church has also been visited and Morningside and Fairmilehead Churches will each have similar opportunities to hold discussions between their Session members and Deployment Committee representatives the coming weeks.

As noted by Dorothy in February, we must agree a union or unions between two or more of the churches to meet the PMP requirement in this grouping for a reduction from four to three ministers.

All four church buildings will be kept open for worship, but union be-

tween churches will mean a single Kirk Session with the possibility of locally funded ministerial support.

There are various options to be considered – one two-church union, two two-church unions or one three-church union – as well as getting to grips with the nitty-gritty of how any such union(s) would be structured and made able to happen. It is clear that there is much work still to be done as we strive jointly to find the best way forward for all, ensuring the continuation and development of mission in this part of Presbytery.

There will be months when there is little or no progress to report as discussions continue and approvals are sought or waited for. We will keep you informed and as up-to-date as we can over the coming months.

## Thought for the Month Holy Saturday

At Easter we rejoice that, as the Apostles' Creed sums it up, "on the third day he rose again".

If the first day was when Jesus was executed and was buried, Good Friday, and if the third day was the day of resurrection, Easter, what has happened to the second day, to Saturday?

Too often we treat Holy Saturday simply as the day before Easter Sunday. Because we know how the story continues, it is easy to anticipate the resurrection, with its renewal of life and restoration of light. We forget that Holy Saturday is the day after Good Friday, and so a time of numbness, grief, and mourning.

Between the Creed's affirmation of crucifixion, death, and burial and its triumphant "on the third day he rose again", are the words "he descended into hell".

In the Bible's view, hell is nothingness and emptiness. It is the absence of life, of light, even of God. Is it, then, too much to claim that the "descent into hell" is a pictorial way of saying that Jesus experienced godlessness, total estrangement from his Father, spiritual sufferings beyond bodily death? This means that Jesus experienced the depths of inhuman cruelty, meaninglessness, and despair

which are all too common a part of most people's lives.

However, it is not enough to say that Jesus sympathises with us in our extremity. His descent into hell is not simply a visit to console those who are experiencing Holy Saturday, leaving them there. Christians have always believed that in ways beyond our understanding Jesus's suffering and death achieved something. Jesus descended into hell to bring its prisoners back with him — into life, into light, into the saving presence of God.

On Holy Saturday we are between death and resurrection, between the undeniable and inconceivable. All who have suffered the death of a loved one have experienced Holy Saturday. All who take seriously the suffering and tragedy that seems an intrinsic part of the human condition know we live in a Holy Saturday world.

None of us can avoid the troubles we see or experience, including suffering, tragedy, and death, both in our personal lives and in our world. That we can face up to them is because Jesus descended to the dead and because the calendar does not stop on Holy Saturday, but continues on to the third day when he rose again.

#### **Scottish Love in Action**

Four of us from Scottish Love in Action recently visited India and met our partners – the first visit since Covid times. SLA now supports three projects in Hyderabad, all supporting vulnerable children and young people. We were impressed by what we saw – it seemed that Covid had caused difficulties for our partners but they have used this as a challenge to accelerate and expand the work they do.

ASRITHA Home now looks after 75 girls. They also now support countless boys and girls in Community Hubs, helping children who live in slums with food, education, advice on their future...and fun.

**Livelihoods** supports young men and women into adulthood, helping them find jobs, and navigate life – with advice on accommodation.

managing money, cookery, and even – important in India – getting married.

Voice 4 Girls now works with girls and boys aged 13-14 and young adults aged 18, telling them about health, safety, and their rights not to be married young or enter the labour market early. When they delivered this programme to young people at home during Covid (using What's App and mobile phones) they found that what the young people had learnt was immediately shared with friends. Building on this, VOICE is supporting young women to go into villages and communities to directly share this information.

Scottish Love in Action is grateful for all the support over the years from Greenbank Church – the

girls and boys, young women and men in India say "thank you".

### **Eco Domesticity - What it's Really Like!**

Last month, John Ferguson described how his household is operating more sustainably and this article tells of our similar efforts.

For years we have recycled, reduced car travel and grown organic vegetables for maximum composting and reduced landfill. Some years back we made the big step of installing solar panels and laying a green driveway (using mesh and grass seedlings), and more recently an electric car charging point.



Eighteen months ago, like the Fergusons, we went the whole hog and installed a heat pump, removing gas entirely from the house. We installed under-floor heating with insulation in the ground floor public

areas. Radiators replaced an old and inefficient 1960s gas warm air system. Inevitably, this was traumatic! We were out of our house for two months and still had to lay a new hardwood floor over the heating pipes, and partially redecorate. The physical work was one thing but there were long waits and complications getting certification for our scheme with Home Energy Scotland (www.homeenergyscotland.org/)

and clearing our lines on loans and grants. In removing gas, a new induction hob has the mega benefit of an easy-clean cooking area!

Recently we reduced to one car – a hybrid, charging it using surplus energy from the roof panels. Surprisingly this works well even in winter when the sun is low and the days gloomy.

The main reflections are that going green this way is a pretty tough ticket. You must be ready for big changes and a lot of hassle. The increased energy prices not helped and our energy costs are pretty stiff. The heat pump is four times more efficient than gas but currently gas is a quarter of the price of electricity, resulting in about the same monthly outlay. The heat exchanger/boiler and heat pump are quite big, the former taking up a lot of garage space. Heat pump installations can

cost more than £15,000, but grant schemes can cover up to £9,000 of the outlay, depending on the particulars of each case.

On the plus side our house is continuously comfortable and the

under-floor heating gives luxury never previously experienced by the Jacks!

What have we still to do? Investing in a big domestic battery would capture more solar energy for our use, but it's quite a big outlay. We also need to look at our carbon footprint on holiday travel and move more convincingly to a greater plant-based diet.

Given our heat pump experience, as an act of faith we need to lobby government to invest in more rapid national renewable energy infrastructure programmes. This includes support to assist domestic conversions, more creative installation methods for flats, massive insulation programmes for low-income households and pushing for societal change in all these areas!
